

Plant America Grant

PLANT AMERICA GRANT DEADLINE OCTOBER 15



PLANT AMERICA Community Project Grants help enhance and beautify our public areas and community gardens. Project grants to NGC member clubs help educate adults and children about the joys of gardening and create pride throughout the community. Grants may be used for physical landscaping or environmental projects, or for horticultural or educational opportunities for the community.

Grants have been awarded to NGC member clubs since 2017. More than 250 grants have been awarded, totaling more than \$225,000. Grants are awarded in amounts up to \$2,000 (an increase from past years).

The Plant America program allows clubs to apply for community grants to help with community beautification projects, community and/or school gardens, landscaping for Blue Star Memorials or Habitat for

Humanity homes, or public horticultural or environmental programs or events. Club applications are **due**October 15, 2025 with funds awarded in January or February of 2026 and projects completed by

February 28, 2027. Final reports are required. Applications are available online at

https://www.gardenclub.org/plant-america-community-project-grants and easy to fill out. Applications can then be submitted to the web-address on the form. Please remember to follow the form's guidelines, especially with the description, timeline and the judging criteria! **Note** that previous recipients are currently not eligible to apply.

Who is eligible? -

- Any member who is a NGC student*, accredited, life, master or Emeritus judge (an NGC student* judge has successfully completed 3 Flower Show School Courses- see p. 114, Handbook)
- And now any garden club member who meets the requirements on the attached form is also eligible....

What are the NGC rules now?

*Currently, at our NGC Standard Flower Shows with photography sections, 3 judges are required:

two of whom are Photography Professionals, Camera Club Judges or Garden Club of America photography judges

and the third may be an accredited or master NGC flower show judge.

New England Garden Clubs Pilot Program to certify Photography Judges

As of July, 2025

Any New England GC flower show judge (student, accredited, life, master, emeritus), who is a member of a federated club in the

New England, or garden club member who meets these requirements is eligible to become certified as an NEGC Photography Judge.

Please provide information about sufficient training in Photography as described below:

Requirements:

- You exhibit successfully in photography shows: won 5 (five) blues, or 5 (five) 90+ or been a finalist in 5 juried shows or any combination of these in garden club, camera club, community, local, regional, national, international photography competitions.
- You worked on or ran 3 photography shows/ photo exhibits/ social media site /photo workshops for your club, camera club, state or other
- You served on 3 photography judging panels as a clerk
- You served on 3 photography judging panels as a National Garden Club, lnc. flower show judge
- You wrote a photography show schedule
- You attended 5 photography workshops in person, or via zoom offered by garden clubs, camera clubs, photography groups, photography instructors, National Organizations
- You ran or presented photography lectures, programs, workshops at a garden club, camera club, symposium, or other venue
- you have attended 2 NGC flower show schools

SMOKEY BEAR & WOODSY OWL POSTER CONTEST

Children from first through fifth grade are invited to participate in the National Garden Clubs, Inc Poster Contest! The U. S. Department of Agriculture, Forest Service and the National Garden Clubs, Inc., are giving students the opportunity to demonstrate their understanding of wildfire prevention and basic environmental conservation principles through original drawings of Smokey Bear or Woodsy Owl.

SMOKEY BEAR SAYS: "ONLY YOU CAN PREVENT WILDFIRES!"

Smokey Bear is recognized nationally and internationally as the symbol for fire prevention. The original Smokey Bear appeared in 1944. Smokey's message, "Only You Can Prevent Wildfires!" encourages personal responsibility for fire prevention. Smokey teaches children and adults to be careful with campfires, barbecues, trash fires and matches.





WOODSY OWL SAYS: LEND A HAND – CARE FOR THE LAND! Woodsy Owl is America's icon for the conservation of the environment. Since 1971, Woodsy has helped parents and teachers inspire children to observe, explore, and care for the environment. He challenges children to "Lend a Hand, Care for the Land!" and to take an active role in caring for the land through recycling, reusing, and reducing waste, gardening, planting and caring for trees, using resources wisely, and not littering.

NHFGC club members are encouraged to support this very important Youth Project. In many instances this may be the only time these iconic messages are heard. If you would like Smokey or Woodsy to attend an event for the children participating in this program, please let Deb Drake know and we will work on arranging a visit through the Forest Service.

Deb Drake has packets of material to help you get started and items to use as giveaways to the participants. She looks forward to hearing from you and helping with this project. 
NGC High School Distinguished Service Project Award

Bringing gardening and our youth together is an exciting process and can be fun for parents, grandparents, or other adult friends.

The High School Distinguished Service Project Award along with \$100 for first place and \$50 for second place may be awarded to a high school student, grades 9-12, for an outstanding civic project making a significant improvement for public benefit, e.g. environment, conservation, landscape, horticulture, recycling, horticulture therapy, etc. A single member club, group of member clubs, districts or a state garden club must sponsor the project.


If you know of someone who has done an outstanding civic project consider applying for Award #YW-7, High School Distinguished Service Project under Youth Work Awards.

NGC Youth Pollinator Gardens Grant

National Garden Clubs, Inc. is excited to provide a grant opportunity for Garden Clubs working with youth clubs or groups planning and planting Pollinator Gardens. Grants, up to \$200, are available for projects that include educational materials on the vital role pollinators play in nature and youth involvement in planning and planting gardens providing nesting and food sources for pollinators. Youth will learn the importance of providing appropriate food sources, nesting areas, shelter, and practicing sustainable gardening practices for pollinators by planning, planting, and maintaining these pollinator gardens.



To apply for a grant, complete an NGC Grant Application, provide detailed information about the project, and submit your request to the NGC Youth Committee Chairman for approval. NGC Youth Sculpture Contest

Your club can encourage students to keep our planet green and to get involved with saving the environment by sponsoring this contest with local children in your area. Students in grades 4 through 8 are eligible to create a sculpture of recyclable, reused, and reduced materials. The sculpture is limited in width to 8-1/2 inches by 11 inches. Height should be proportional to width.

NGC Youth Poetry Contest

Excite and encourage our youth to express and explore their creative thoughts through different types of poetry. NGC's Poetry Contest enables our Youth to embrace their creativity through the art of writing. Youth in K-12 are eligible for this contest. All the winning entries will be compiled into a booklet which will be made available electronically to the winners.



The 2025-2026 theme is "Plant America for the Next 100 Years". Poems do not have to rhyme and may be traditional verse, acrostics, blank verse, cinquains, diamond poems, limerick, or Haiku. Congratulations to our extremely talented designers.

On a beautiful cool summer evening in July, the AGC toured Longview Farm in Plymouth, NH. Regina Rinaldo gave us a tour of their 119 acres plus of fields that provide beautiful vegetables to our community. Like all area gardeners, we at the Atkinson Garden Club are continually rising to the challenge of keeping all our town plantings well weeded, watered and fed, despite the outlandishly high temperatures, dry spells or drenching rain! (It is New England, after all, with the effects of climate change thrown in for good measure!) Kudos to our Civic Beautification Chair, Nicole Cummings and her Committee, and all our club members who participate in this endeavor to maintain the beauty of our town.

We continue to seriously examine our roles in this climate change crisis and consider what we can do to make a difference, both as a garden club and as individuals. Under the capable and impassioned leadership of Michael Hosker Bouley, this committee continues to grow! Meeting topics with documentation handed out to club members, have included the detrimental role of CO 2 in the greenhouse effect, best trees to plant for absorbing CO 2 in New Hampshire, and helping decrease greenhouse gases through composting. Also, abiding by our mission statement of environmental responsibility, we are discussing how we can positively impact our environment by using all non-plastic materials at our club meetings for refreshment related items such as cups, plates, table covers, utensils, etc.


